Emily, this the second story you've written about Pete. Please tell us about his new adventure in PETE MAKES A MISTAKE.

This is a story about a mix-up—in other words, it's a farce. Pete means well, but he is careless. This causes a misunderstanding between his sister and her friends. But Pete manages to fix everything. I hope readers will laugh.

Where did you get your inspiration for this story?

Who knows? It just popped into my head. But parties always make me a little nervous: will people come? Will I have a good time?

Readers will recognize Pete from PETE WON'T EAT, the first story about Pete in the I Like to Read® series. What made you decide to bring Pete back for this story?

I love him. Drawing him and imagining his experiences frees me.

What do you hope readers will learn from PETE MAKES A MISTAKE?

First of all, I hope they learn to read a story with pleasure. I'm not sure there is another lesson, but learning to correct a "mistake" is a good thing.

When did you know you wanted to be an author and illustrator?

When I was pretty young—maybe second grade. I loved reading and drawing more than anything and began to dream of creating books for other people to read.

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






If you could give any advice to young authors and illustrators, what would it be?
